Last year when my wife Jude and I made the decision for me to finish at the end of Term 2 this year, that decision was made after a great deal of planning and consideration. When I confirmed our decision with Jo Malcom, our BOT chairperson at the start of this year it felt like a very comfortable, sensible, strategic decision well made. However, there comes a time when the decisions we make with the "head" are finally recognised by the "heart" and that is now happening.

I believe I summed things up well in my resignation letter to the Board of Trustees.

I leave Principalship, and St Martins School, with the feeling that it is the right time for me and also for the school.

The past 10 years as leader have been both professionally and personally rewarding. I have relished the opportunity to lead St Martins School through the challenging times presented by the Canterbury earthquakes and well into the process of building a new school while growing, leading and working with a team of exceptional educators. Despite the tremendous challenges presented during this time it has been a privilege and a pleasure to work with the children, the staff, the community and the Board of Trustees of St Martins School.

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It is important that I acknowledge what an exceptional and wonderful learning community St Martins is. This school has a unique character that reflects the nature of its community and this has been nurtured and preserved by those trustees who have worked on this Board and by those who have come before. I thank the Board for the faith it has shown in my leadership and for the support it has always given me. I wish to acknowledge Jo Malcolm, not only as the current chairperson, but as the last remaining trustee from the time when I was appointed as principal. Jo, your support, good council and friendship have been invaluable to me and I thank you for your part in allowing me to contribute to this very special community.

It has been a privilege to work with so many great teachers, office and support staff during my 10 years at St Martins School. The professional pride that all our staff show day in and day out is but just one of the reasons St Martins School is an exceptional working and learning environment. The successive '5 Year Reviews' given by the Education Review Office are an indication of the strength and commitment of this team. Leadership is a pleasure when a team works as one and leadership of St Martins School has been a great pleasure.

At its best leadership is not a solo endeavour. I believe that any success that St Martins has had during my time as principal must be credited to our team as a whole. The leadership team of St Martins School is a strong and committed group who have the best interests of the students and their teams at their heart's centre. Our senior leaders have implemented our school strategy with determination to ensure that St Martins School is the best that it can be.

It is important that I acknowledge Bernadette May in her role as Deputy Principal. Educators with the skill and talents Bernadette possesses are rare. Our alignment educationally, strategically and professionally has been quite unique, highly collegial and St Martins School has benefitted because of this synergy.

I must admit that this decision has not been an easy one but it is well considered. I have always said that "change is a good thing" and sometimes we need to place ourselves outside our comfort zone. I did so in coming to St Martins School and I do so again in leaving. What I take great comfort in is what has been achieved during my time as principal of St Martins School, but more so is the knowledge that because of its community, its Board of Trustees, the staff and the amazing leadership talent that exists within the school it will continue to move forward and "Inspire a Passion For Learning".
